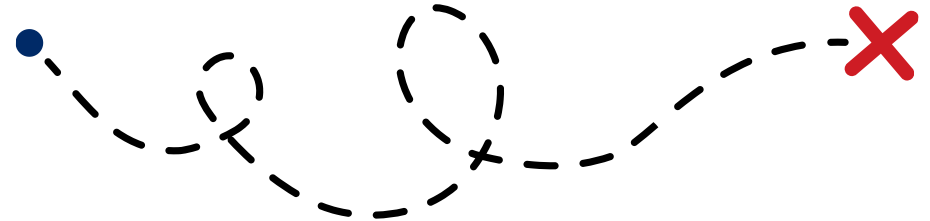




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Accusation: When you say that someone did something wrong.

Better to be safe than sorry: It is better to be careful than to take a risk.

Cabin: A small wooden house, usually in the countryside or forest.

Campfire: A fire made outdoors.

Case: A crime or mystery that the police try to solve.

Caught red-handed: Found while doing something wrong.

Check it out: To look at something to learn more about it.

Clue: Something that helps solve a mystery or answer a question.

Compass: A tool that helps you find your way using North, South, East, and West.

Disappear: To no longer be seen.

Emergency: A serious situation that needs immediate help.

Evidence: Information or objects that help show what happened.

First aid kit: A box or bag with things used when someone is hurt.

Flashlight/Torch: A small electric light you can carry in your hand.

Footsteps: The sounds made by someone walking.

Full moon: The moon when it looks completely round once a month.

Give it a rest: To stop talking about or doing something annoying.

Hike: A long walk outdoors, usually in the countryside.

Horror/Ghost story: A scary story, often about ghosts or frightening events.

Interrogation: When the police ask someone questions to find out what happened.

Investigate: To try to find out the truth.

Jam: A sweet food made from fruit and sugar.

Jump to conclusions: To decide something without knowing all the facts.

Kill: To make a person or animal die.

Know something like the back of your hand: To know a place or thing very well.

Lie: To say something that is not true.

Lost: Unable to find your way.

Make sense: To be clear and easy to understand.

Map: A drawing that shows where places are.

Missing: When a person cannot be found.

Off trail: Away from the marked path.

Panic: A sudden feeling of fear that makes it difficult to think clearly.

Proof: Information that shows something is true.

Ranger: A person who looks after a park or forest.

Rational explanation: A clear and logical reason that explains what happened.

Safe and sound: Not in danger or hurt.

Sausage: Food made from meat in a long, round shape.

Separated: Not together anymore.

Set up a tent: To put up a tent so it is ready to use.

Shadow: A dark shape made when something blocks the light.

Shelter: A place that keeps you safe from weather or danger.

Sleeping bag: A warm bag used for sleeping, especially when camping.

Sleepover: A night spent sleeping at someone else's home.

Stay on the trail: To keep walking on the marked path.

Steal: To take something that does not belong to you.

Stick together: To stay together and not separate.

Storm: Bad weather with strong wind, rain or thunder.

Suspicious: Making you think something is wrong.

Tent: A fabric shelter used for sleeping outdoors, especially when camping.

Track: To follow signs or clues to find someone or something.

Trail: A path through a forest or countryside.

Under arrest: When the police take someone because they may have broken the law.

What's the worst that can happen: A question asked to suggest that nothing very bad will happen, rather than to get an answer.

Witness: A person who saw what happened.
